

Why should we read to our children?

We often talk about the importance of families reading to and with their children and I make no apology for returning to this subject in this term's newsletter - research shows us that this is one of the most powerful tools we have, not only in forging positive relationships with our children, but also in supporting them as life-long, successful learners.

Benefits of reading to our children (even our older upper junior children) include:

- Making positive relationships: All children, however young or old, enjoy the warmth and comfort of cuddling up to read with parents and grandparents.
- **Building vocabularies, alphabet and phonic skills:** You can encourage children to point at objects, find particular letters, and when more experienced, to sound out words and explain what they mean. This improves comprehension and communication skills and builds self-confidence.
- **Growing imaginations:** Stories also encourage children's imaginations—so vital if they are to be creative writers themselves.
- **Understanding others:** Books can help children explore other cultures and understand other ways of thinking, develop empathy for others. Ask questions like "What happened in the story?", "What was the lesson to be learned?" and "How do you think you would feel if that happened to you?"
- Preparing for new experiences: Books can help children prepare for transitions and new experiences.
- **Good manners and habits:** Reading through a story helps children work on skills such as paying attention, sitting still, displaying patience and trying not to interrupt so vital if they are to be able to make the most of the learning in their classrooms.
- **Developing a life-long love for learning:** a love of books and reading gives children a massive advantage on their educational journey and can only help in allowing them to realise their true potential and succeed in their aspirations.

Our message to you all is simple:

Time spent reading to and with your children is NEVER wasted time and will DEFINITELY give them enormous advantages as they progress through their educational career.





What's Happening at St Catherine's?

We have had a busy term at St Catherine's. Our bees finally arrived which has been very exciting – we are now able to run a bee club weekly and are celebrating World Bee Day on Friday 20th May. Luna has had her first birthday, SATs have been completed after a 2 year break in both KS1 and KS2. Our Two residentials in year 5 (Adventure Okehampton) and 6 (Bristol) are booked and all classes have trips booked – including to the beach, Dartmoor, The Aviation Museum, The Eden Project and Charlie Bears. We completed a music project highlighting climate issues in Bangladesh, had Cornish mining experts visit, studied Charles Causley, held a Future Visions Science day and this week have a Jubilee Picnic and games afternoon with our families planned.

The biggest event at St Catherine's was our long awaited SIAMs inspection (2 years delayed!). We were really pleased and proud of our school on the day and how each child and adult clearly showed how true and deep our vision and ethos runs through everything we do. We have now received our SIAMs inspection report and we're really pleased with our good result.



Some highlights from the inspectors finding:

"The school's Christian vision inspires leaders to provide excellent pastoral care and support for the mental health and well-being of staff, pupils and families. This enables the whole school community to flour-ish... Supportive leaders have established an effective Christian vision in partnership with An Daras Multi-Academy Trust (MAT).

The school is part of the An Daras MAT, and has strong partnerships with both the Trust and Truro Diocese. This gives access to a range of high-quality training and monitoring. Consequently, staff are given the knowledge and skills to support pupils in their learning and development, allowing them to flourish. The vision is applied in everyday school life, and adds value to the lives and pupils and their community...This means that pupils learn well and flourish...

The school acts as a supportive hub, and makes a strong contribution to the flourishing of this diverse community...It has a clear focus on caring, compassion and countering prejudice...

In line with their vision, there is a strong community focus at this school, which results in an inclusive and supportive learning environment for all pupils, including vulnerable pupils, and those with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND)...

Pupils behave well in classrooms and around the school. This is supported by the schools' behaviour policy and practice which is based on forgiveness and reconciliation, and is respected and supported by parents and pupils alike...

Pupils talk about how they can 'make their dreams come true' by working hard and supporting each other...This means that pupils are resilient, and learn strategies to persevere in their learning when things are difficult." We are so proud!


Mrs Parish and Mrs Bishop would love some suggestions for the names of the two bee hives—No4 and No5 are not that inspiring!
