School Improvement – Reading

We know that the research tells us that the ability to read well is at the heart of the capacity for individuals to be successful both in education and in future working careers. To this end, we continue to be determined to do our very best to give every child the chance to become the best reader they can possibly be.

We continue to deliver the early phonic knowledge vital to reading in EYFS



and KS1 through our "Read Write Inc" scheme which has proven to be extremely successful since its introduction. We have recently added new home reading books to accompany this scheme that allows children to independently practise the sounds that they meet in their daily lessons. Some parents have asked if the books are challenging enough as children seem to read them fluently, but this is exactly how the books are designed to work, because good reading follows on from successful repetition of the sounds learnt. We hope you have found the books a helpful addition to your child's reading journey and that you enjoy sharing them each week.

We cannot stress highly enough how vital it is to continue **reading for enjoyment** with your child, however young or old they are! Sharing the love of books and talking about the characters and events has enormous impact on a child's reading ability and learning in general. To this end through March we will be joining in with **National Book Week's challenge** to reach a million reads across the school community, which could include you and your family sharing together too! We will send out more details of this challenge nearer the time.

We have a committed band of **Reading Champions**, who come to school every week to hear readers from Reception to Year Six. This is extremely beneficial to the children and we are really grateful for the time and effort they put into this.

All teachers plan for **meaningful reading opportunities across the curriculum** and expectations are high for all children. We are creating stimulating, welcoming reading areas in all classes and raising the profile of reading across the school with our staff "Look who's been caught reading" displays. We would love it if families also joined in and posted their own pictures of being caught reading on Dojo!

As you can see in the picture below, we have had a complete make-over in our library, with the help of the librarian service from Babcock. We now have a great selection of fiction and non-fiction books, neatly arranged in alphabetical and numeric order and we have a small group of Year Four/Five children who have been trained as librarians to help staff look after this wonderful resource. This will greatly enhance our provision for reading across the school and we are all really excited to start using it!







Lost Property

We now have a central store of lost property that is kept in the main office. Please continue to ask your child's class teacher in the first place, as most items are found in the class or cloakroom areas, but if this is unsuccessful please call into the office to look in the central store.

Collecting at the End of Day

Can we make a **polite reminder** about parking behaviour when collecting children at the end of day as we have had a number of complaints over the last few weeks. Church School Focus - Spirituality

All Primary schools are required to provide pupils with opportunities to experience and express **spirituality.** This is not an easy concept to define, but one way to view it is as the way in which we can understand ourselves, our relationships with others and our place in our community and the world.

As a church school, we place great importance on collective Worship and the teaching of RE (Religious Education), and spirituality is without doubt an important feature of these areas, but it also influences all areas of the wider curriculum and life generally. As **OFSTED point out "Spiritual development relates to fundamental questions about the meaning and purpose of life which affect everyone, and is not dependant on a religious affiliation."** As such then, it is about us finding out who we are, how we can make relationships with others and how we can respond to the challenges and dilemmas we face in life.

As a "visible Learning" school, where we promote the use of learning powers and enable children to be responsible, reflective learners, spirituality becomes a natural daily occurrence in all learning situations. Every time a child thinks about how they approached a task and if they could be even better they are reflecting on their own spirituality. Every time a child expresses an opinion in a class discussion, they are expressing their own spirituality. Every time a child appreciates the beauty of nature or the power of a poem, they are further developing their own spirituality.

To make it a little easier to talk and reflect on spirituality in the classroom, we use three spirituality icons with the children from Reception to Year Six.



Windows = Encounters learning about: opportunities to look at the world "I learnt that...."



Mirrors = Reflection learning from: look at themselves/others/world/God Big questions!

"It made me wonder......"



Doors = Transformation Action Doing/creating something.

"I decided that"

We use the icons to think about the learning and experiences we have in school, so for instance, children may complete icons after a Collective Worship to record what they have taken away from it.

I had some amazing responses to a recent collective Worship and here are just a few of the comments made:

"I learnt that no one is too small to make big changes."

"I learnt that it doesn't matter who you are, you could always help people in need."

"It made me wonder if the mouse in the story of "The Selfish Crocodile" was someone who helps people, even if they're bad and if I should change my behaviour."

"I have decided to be nice to the people I'm not a big fan of."

"I have decided to do the right thing and be more aware of other people."

As you can see, we have incredibly thoughtful and courageous children who are confident to express their own ideas and beliefs and are brave enough to look at themselves and ask difficult questions. A perfect illustration of why we uphold and promote the importance of spiritual development for all within our school.

Year Five Bikeability

Last week, children in Year Five were given the opportunity to develop their bike riding skills and road safety awareness through Bikeability sessions with Arena. The children were taught how to ride with confidence and awareness of risks on main roads and were able to achieve either Level 1 or 2 depending on their performance over the time of tuition.

This is a hugely beneficial scheme with increasingly busy roads and children wanting greater independence as they get older and gives those that take part the opportunity to experience the challenges of main road riding within a supported, supervised situation.

All the children enjoyed the challenge and were really proud of the progress they made during the day. Well done to all those who took part and make sure you put into practise everything you have learnt when out on your bikes.

Children said: "It was really good. I used to be scared on the road when cars came but now I feel confident." "It taught me that when I signal to turn the most important thing is to look behind me."
